Excerpt from homily of Archbishop Martin at Mass of Remembrance for the bishops' pilgrimage to Knock last Sunday

We are gathering today to remember all those who died during the Covid-19 pandemic. What a cruel time it has been for the dying and the bereaved.

Here in Ireland we traditionally wrap those who are dying, and families who are bereaved, in a blanket of love and care. We accompany our relatives and friends in their suffering, and surround them with love and prayer and gently assist them in body, in mind and in spirit. All human life remains precious until the moment of natural death. That is why we tend to their pain, while always assuring them that they remain loved and valued in those final moments — and especially so, because they are so completely vulnerable and dependent on others.

Sadly, in many cases during the Covid pandemic, those precious, final moments saw increased heartbreak. At a time when physical closeness is so important, and our caring instinct is to hug someone, or hold their hand, it was distressing that often the final words of love and prayer had to be spoken over a telephone, or from behind windows and screens, or masks or visors.

Many families over these past nineteen months have walked the Way of the Cross with Jesus. Thankfully, along that Way, they were able to meet kindly 'Veronicas' – in the shape of our amazing and dedicated health workers and carers who put themselves out to wipe the brow and dry the tears of our suffering and dying brothers and sisters.

And there were many 'Simons' and 'Good Samaritans' helping others to shoulder their burden; offering messages of hope and encouragement to say, "you are not forgotten" and "even if we cannot hold your hands or give you a hug, we still care deeply for you", and, "we hold you close in our prayers and in our hearts."

In a special way today in Knock we remember, with deep gratitude and prayer, the 'heroes' who kept our health, emergency, chaplaincy and other essential services going during the pandemic, often denying themselves in the cause of compassion, charity and love. And they are still doing it, today and every day. These heroes remain at their posts – dedicated, often exhausted, under huge pressures and staff shortages, but always deeply committed to their vocation of love and care and mercy.
